# PERCUSSION TECHNIQUES

2016 - 2017 SYLLABUS

PART 1: COURSE INFORMATION

#### **Instructor Information**

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#### Course Description

The Percussion Techniques class is designed to offer students the opportunity to develop a deeper understanding of the percussion instrument family, and offer performance experiences that more specifically challenge and adhere to a percussionist's needs. This class will also expose students to other areas of percussion performance through marching band drum line music; indoor drum line show; and concert percussion ensemble opportunities. Students will also utilize non-traditional areas of percussion such as "found" instruments; non-traditional notation; unique voiced ensembles; and extended techniques only found in percussion-specific music.

#### Course Overview

#### There will be four different frameworks for this course:

- 1. <u>Group Rehearsal The first semester of the percussion class will focus on skills found in the marching percussion ensemble.</u> Focusing on techniques and music for Football and Basketball half-time performances. These opportunities will help develop the techniques that are focused on in the technique classes. This will also help develop internal timing, "chops," and ensemble awareness.
- 2. <u>Technique Classes –</u> Students will be told the basic techniques and considerations among various percussion instruments. They will also spend time developing the basic techniques to be used in the literature chosen for concert.
- 3. <u>Small Ensemble Rehearsals</u> This structure will allow for 3 4 different ensembles to rehearse simultaneously. Upperclassmen will be chosen to be "coaches" for the ensembles, allowing them an opportunity to teach. Other students will get performance experience through small ensemble playing.
- 4. <u>Project-Based Rehearsals –</u> Students will be broken into small groups to create, develop, rehearse, and perform a piece using the methods, instruments, and techniques learned throughout the year.

# PART 2: STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- Students will develop their basic understanding of a percussionist's role in various settings.
- Students will develop and apply a basic understanding of various percussion instruments and techniques to be used in performance.
- Students will develop technical abilities on various percussion instruments to achieve a highly executed performance.
- Students will create a musical composition using techniques, instruments, and knowledge to inform musical choices.

- Students will develop physical abilities to perform a technical musical passage while executing visually appropriate interpretation.
- Students will analyze and adapt to conclusions drawn from a performance to apply to the next performance opportunity.

You will meet the objectives listed above through a combination of the following activities in this course:

- Attend all classes.
- Perform in Two Percussion-specific performances.
- Perform in Concert Band Concerts.
- Perform in a half-time marching band show.
- Explore concrete definitions, and the means of breaking those definitions to better accomplish a task.

# PART 3: CLASS OVERVIEW/SCHEDULE

- Unit 01: Drum Line & Standard Techniques
  - o Focusing on marching band music, pep band music, and stand cheers.
  - Good Practice Habits
  - O Discuss and develop basic techniques on Snare Drum, Keyboard Instruments, Timpani (Crash & Bass if time)
- Unit 02: Indoor Percussion Show & Standard Techniques

  - Techniques on: Bass Drum & Crash Cymbals; Tambourine & Triangle;

  - Once a year, there will be a large project that students will choose, create, develop, and perform. These vary year-to-year and provide students with a unique opportunity to apply their skills and knowledge in a non-traditional way.

# UNIT 04: COMPOSITION, RESEARCH, AND/OR PERFORMANCE PROJECTS & ADVANCED TECHNIQUES

Preparation for our final concert, this includes the group project performance(s), and new, more traditional, percussion ensemble music.

#### Course Challenge System

Each quarter students will have an opportunity to a prize by having the highest score for successfully completing specific challenges for points. Students will have to complete the challenges with perfect, or near-perfect accuracy. There is no limit to how many challenges the students are allowed to compete, and there is no set order to specific sets of challenges. The amount of points awarded are based on how difficult the challenge is. The harder the challenge, the more points. Students may choose whichever challenge they feel they have enough time to accomplish. Testing times for these challenges are yet to be determined. This challenge system is designed to motivate students to practice skills that will transfer into their playing, Challenges include completed exercises at specific tempos and performing solos; if a piece of music is not on the list, it needs approval and a point rating BEFORE it is played for points. If a student fails to complete the challenge, they may retest at the specified times to possibly receive the points.

Each quarter, students are required to get 50 points from challenges they complete. For qualification to audition for Wind Ensemble, students need at least 600 points BEFORE the audition, and 400 points for Wind Symphony.

\*\*\*Students could possibly get partial points for attempting challenges (5 star rating), however, this approach is to be determined.

#### Indoor Drumline Rehearsals

Due to space availability, the Percussion Methods class will meet before school twice a week to rehearse the indoor program in the gym. It is important that all students attend these rehearsals as they are the only opportunity to rehearse drill and put the show together. Any conflicts that may occur should be well communicated in advanced to ensure that minimal time is wasted by the ensemble. Rehearsal time is extremely limited, and the success of the group is contingent on member's dedication and attendance.

#### Wind Ensemble Percussionists

To earn honors credit for the class, percussionists that are in Wind Ensemble <u>must</u> coach one percussion ensemble in the second semester. This will require a greater knowledge of a piece of music, analytical abilities to identify trouble areas, and basic scheduling abilities to ensure that enough time is given to all areas of the piece.
